The Robert A. Schanke Research Award

The Robert A. Schanke Research Award recognizes excellence in theatre scholarship through an award presented by the Theatre History Symposium of the Mid America Theatre Conference.

In 2005, a gift of \$5,000 was made by Professor Robert A. Schanke to establish an award that recognizes research excellence initially presented at the Mid-America Theatre Conference. The Mid-America Theatre Conference has matched Professor Schanke's gift to establish a \$10,000 award. Professor Schanke has served as a noted theatre educator and scholar in his forty year career. He has edited Theatre History Studies for thirteen years and is the author and editor of several volumes of theatre scholarship, including Gay and Lesbian Theatrical Legacy, coedited with Billy Harbin and Kim Marra; "That Furious Lesbian": The Story of Mercedes de Acosta; Women in Turmoil: Six Plays by Mercedes de Acosta; Staging Desire: Oueer Readings of American Theater History, coedited with Kim Marra; Passing Performances: Queer Readings of Leading Players in American Theater History, coedited with Kim Marra; Shattered Applause: The Lives of Eva Le Gallienne: Eva Le Gallienne: A Bio-Bibliography; and Ibsen in America: A Century of Change.

The Robert A. Schanke Research Award is given annually to an untenured faculty presenter of the Theatre History Symposium and carries a cash award of \$500 as well as subsequent publication of the paper in *Theatre History Studies*, the journal of the Mid-America Theatre Conference.

Michal Kobialka

Michal Kobialka is Chair and Professor of Theatre at the Department of Theatre Arts & Dance, University of Minnesota. His articles and reviews have been published in Årsberetning (Denmark), Assaph (Israel), Journal of Dramatic Theory and Criticism, Journal of Theatre and Drama (Israel), Medieval Perspectives, Performing Arts Journal, Theatre Annual, The Drama Review, Theatre Journal, Theatre History Studies, Theatre Nordic Studies (Sweden), Theatre Research International (England), Theatre Survey, Slavic and East European Journal, Soviet and East-European Performance, and Yearbook of Interdisciplinary Studies in the Fine Arts. He has presented papers on medieval and contemporary European theatre and on theatre historiography at various regional, national, and international conferences.

His book on Tadeusz Kantor's Theatre, A Journey Through Other Spaces: Essays and Manifestos, 1944-1990, was published by University of California Press in August 1993. He is the editor of Of Borders and Thresholds: Theatre History, Practice, and Theory (University of Minnesota Press, 1999) and a co-editor (with Barbara Hanawalt) of Medieval Practices of Space (University of Minnesota Press, 2000). His book on the early medieval drama and theatre, This Is My Body: Representational Practices in the Early Middle Ages, (University of Michigan Press, 1999) received the 2000 ATHE Research Award for Outstanding Book in Theatre Practice and Pedagogy. He has just finished a critical book-length study of Tadeusz Kantor's theatre.

He has held a McKnight Land-Grant Professorship (1991-1993), a Bush Sabbatical Supplement Award (1996), a Fesler-Lampert Professorship in the Humanities (2003-2004), and a Hoffman Chair at Florida State University (2004-05).

Conference Keynote: Lou Bellamy

LOU BELLAMY is Founder and Artistic Director of Penumbra Theatre Company and an Associate Professor in the Department of Theatre and Dance at the University of Minnesota, where he has been a member of the faculty for 28 years. Founded 30 years ago, Penumbra Theatre Company has gained national recognition for its artistic excellence, its role in theatre development, and the vital link it maintains to its surrounding community. Bellamy graduated with a BA from Minnesota State University, Mankato, and received his MA from the University of Minnesota. Among the awards he has received for excellence in arts and education are the W. Harry Davis Foundation Award for Leadership in Afro-centric Education, the Links Award in Recognition of Excellence in Black Theatre, and a doctorate from Hamline University. Bellamy's directing credits include: Reflections of Black Nativity, Dinah Was, On the Open Road, King Hedley II, Someplace Soft to Fall, Blues for an Alabama Sky, Seven Guitars, Two Trains Running, Portrait of the Artist as a Soul Man Dead, Three Ways Home, The African American Company Presents Richard III. His acting credits include lead roles in Fences, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, The Piano Lesson, Waiting in Vain, and Talking Bones. Among many other honors, Bellamy recently received the 2006 McKnight Distinguished Artist Award.
