The Region V FACT Festival

Every two years, the American Community Theatre Association sponsors a nationwide series of play festivals. The festivals begin in January and February at the state level; the winner of each state festival then continues to one of nine regional festivals.

The plays being produced this weekend at the E.C. Mabie Theatre are the winning representatives from states in the Region V area: Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, and Iowa. They are competing to determine which theatre will represent Region V in the National FACT Festival, to be held in June in Haines, Alaska.

The performance schedule is included in this program along with the schedule of MATC events. We have arranged the program so that Festival performance times do not conflict with the schedule of workshops and other special events.

Box Office Information

The E.C. Mabie Theatre is located in the middle of the University campus, on the west side of the Iowa River. To get there from the Iowa Memorial Union, take the foot bridge across the river, then turn right and walk north past the Art Building and Art Museum. The Theatre is the next building north of the Art Museum.

The box office in the lobby of Mabie Theatre will be open one hour before the first scheduled performance each day, and will remain open until after the beginning of the final performance of that day.

Tickets may be purchased for \$5.00 per day, good for all Festival performances for that day. Or you may buy a packet of tickets, good for all three days, for \$12.50.

Following each performance, there is a period of one half hour set aside for an immediate adjudication of each production. Our three distinguished adjudicators for this year's festival are:
